Opposition to Mandatory Maintenance of Certification (MOC) Subject:

Referred to: Reference Committee

1 Whereas, physicians are among the nation's most rigorously trained professionals; and

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Whereas, requirements for maintaining the skills needed to serve their patients vary greatly

4 depending upon their patient population and chosen set of treatments offered; and

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6 Whereas, no one is in a better position than the individual physician to determine how best 7 to maintain those needed skills; and

Whereas, other professionals such as lawyers are not subjected to mandatory recertification

9 requirements; and

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Whereas, certification requirements are costly and time-intensive, requiring significant 12 disruptions in availability of the physician for patient care; and

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14 Whereas, there is no evidence that mandatory recertification results in any improvement 15 in patient care; and

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17 Whereas, there are significant conflicts of interest in agencies approved to set the 18 requirements; and

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20 Whereas, more than half of the highly qualified and respected faculty members of one of our best universities failed the mandated recertification examination, without any evidence 22 that the problem was with the examinees rather than the examination; and

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24 Whereas, constant externally imposed study requirements tend to enforce conformity 25 rather than encourage the independence of thought essential for professionals; and

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Whereas, mandatory recertification is likely to reduce access to care by encouraging retirement of great physicians who are providing excellent, much needed care taking

29 30	significant amounts of time away from patient care; and
31	Whereas, failure rates for MOC have been as high as 40.9 % for one board; and
33 34 35	Whereas, mandatory recertification empowers government and disenfranchises patients and professionals; and
36 37 38	Whereas, there is currently no existing Missouri State Medical Association (MSMA) policy calling for opposition to mandatory MOC; therefore be it
39 40 41	Resolved, That the MSMA opposes mandatory MOC, and encourages physicians to strive constantly to improve their care of patients by the means they find most effective; and be it further
42 43 44 45	Resolved, That the MSMA acknowledges that the certification requirements within the MOC process are costly, time intensive and result in significant disruptions to the availability of physicians for patient care; and be it further
46 47 48 49	Resolved, That MSMA acknowledges and affirms the professionalism of individual physicians to self-determine the best means and methods for maintenance of their knowledge and skills; and be it further
50 51 52 53	Resolved, That MSMA communicate to the American Medical Association (AMA) and American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS) examples of disproportional fees and onerous time requirements and be it further
54 55	Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the AMA House of Delegates for its consideration.
